IT'S BEEN ASKED BEFORE – like most spiritual and psychological questions – but in Lent it's worth asking again: 'Am I drawn or am I driven?'

We know we need to care for our neighbour, but when we think of this, do we feel a lift in our hearts or a prod between our shoulder-blades? As teachers and parents, we can be tempted to think that the most effective way of getting something done, and especially done by children, is to push, prod, nag or threat – *drive* in another word.

Indeed, if we're the ones endlessly picking up wet towels, or feeding the dog, or putting out the rubbish, or wondering whether homework is being done, the prod comes all-too-readily to hand. But surely we know from our own experience, especially perhaps from driving ourselves, the place between the shoulder-blades gets tighter and tighter and that delicate organ, the human heart, lays down small deposits of resentment. And one day, sadly, the

build-up of resentment spills out. There must be a better way of doing what needs to be done than driving ourselves to it, or even bribing ourselves (*I use Tim-Tams*), let alone doing it to our neighbour, especially those at home or in the classroom.

Why not try the 'draw' option? Why not tap into our own deep desires and strong values and go for that, go forward or towards them, be drawn by them? Whereas being driven shrinks to a single tight feeling, as our tautened bodies tell us, being drawn opens us up to many rich feelings. So, because we treasure our neighbour, because we are aware of what he or she brings into our lives, we turn towards him/her with gratitude, delight, concern, compassion, empathy, and more; we can laugh or cry with them. Because we know the Good Lord identifies with our neighbour, we rush towards him in them. Where else are we likely to find him so close and human?

Make the most of what you can while you still have the chance

GUESTS AT THIS WEEK'S COLLEGE ASSEMBLY were the 2006 Dux of the College, Andrew Biady and Equal Proximi, Gerard Smyth and Michael Falk. Andrew was accompanied by his parents, while Gerard was there with his father and Michael attended with his grandparents.

Gerard Smyth gained outstanding results in the HSC. He came second in the State in 2 Unit Studies of Religion and earned a Band 6 result in 10 units of his HSC. Gerard gained a UAI of 99.75 and was recently awarded a Premier's All Rounder's Award. Michael Falk also gained outstanding results last year. He achieved first place in the State in the Distinction course of Comparative Literature, a course only open to students who have accelerated in a subject in Year 11. Michael also received a Premier's All Rounder's Award and gained a UAI of 99.75

Andrew Biady's results last year were truly remarkable. In the HSC he achieved a UAI of 99.80 and also received a Premier's Award. In the HSC College results, Andrew was placed first

in Chemistry, first in Physics, first in French, first in Extension 1 Mathematics and first in Extension 2 Mathematics. This assembly is held every year at this time to acknowledge those students who achieved the highest marks in the HSC.

We believe it fitting that we celebrate the success of these young men who worked extremely hard during their years at Riverview to achieve such outstanding results in the HSC. In addition, we celebrated the academic excellence of the entire class of 2006 who produced the best results the school has received for some time.

We also believe it valuable to present Andrew, Gerard and Michael as role models for our current students. As I told the assembly, 'every student at Riverview sitting here today would one day like the opportunity of receiving an award for excellence', however, it's important that they realize this cannot be achieved without hard work. The fact that I got a Band 6 in my worst subject, is not so much a credit to me as it is a credit to the department and I guess it's proof that anyone can change the way their marks are heading. So if there's one thing I'd like you to take away today, it's that getting involved with teachers and asking questions is the best way to make progress. My Physics teacher Mr Byrne would often be detained by me and my friends after class answering totally unrelated questions about any thoughts that popped into our minds about Physics and he never seemed to mind.

While I'm mentioning teachers, I should thank Mr Charlton for his support throughout the year in Mathematics, and the staggering amount of handouts he gave us which were actually incredibly helpful. And Chemistry wouldn't be the same without Mr Szabo who went out of his way to help us prepare for the HSC (I understand he had a difficult time controlling a young group of boys more interested in chemicals and making test tubes turn different colours than actually learning anything).

I would also like to thank my French teacher, Ms Giovanetti, who has been teaching me for at least 4 or 5 years, and really made me learn to love the French language and culture. And last but not least, Fr Bullen and Mr. Byrne who taught me School-Based Religion, and really challenged us to think outside the box. If, like me, you're not a fan of Studies of Religion, school-based is really worth considering. We just had relaxed classes where we would chat about issues and problems in the world.

One of the great things about Riverview is the spirit of involvement that it inspires. While I was at school I didn't go on the Cambodian Immersion which was a decision that I would really regret later. My close friends all did the Immersion and came back having had life changing experiences. So after school finished, I spent a few months working in some truly terrible jobs, saving up a bit of money, and in January I went overseas to Vietnam and Cambodia with James Rogge, Michael De Silva, and Jarred Bambridge who were also at Riverview with me.

I admit my goals on the trip weren't as altruistic as building houses for the poor, but part of the trip for me was to appreciate another culture. On the budget we travelled with, we often stayed in the poorest areas and made friends with many locals, all of whom had so many interesting stories about life that made the trip worthwhile. Unfortunately, we had to cut the trip short due to the tragic news about James Rogge's dad, Tony, whose funeral was held here in the Chapel a few weeks ago.

But the one thing that came out of it is that being immersed in another culture is an experience that no-one should be without. And I cannot encourage you enough to take part in the Cambodia Immersion Program, or any of the other exchanges that Riverview offers, such as the French Exchange which I took part in a few years ago. It's all too easy to be comfortable with life here in the suburb of Riverview, especially if you board here, because we are only exposed to a certain type of people, and it's easy to forget the world outside.

So I guess if you haven't realised it yet, the main theme of this speech is to make the most of what you can while you still have the chance. Opportunity is a terrible thing to waste. My own background is a mixture of Egyptian and French, and my grandfather left everything behind in Egypt to come to Australia with a young family only 37 years ago. It was a risky sacrifice to come

to Australia with practically nothing, and my dad went to school knowing only three responses in English, Yes, No and Shut up!

Maybe not everyone here comes from a migrant family, but you would not have to look too far in your background for a lot of you to find someone

who worked two jobs, or struggled to save because their dream was to be able to provide the opportunities to their children that Riverview offers. For us to sit back and not make the most of our parents' sacrifice would truly be a shame. To go to a school that boasts not only one of the highest success rates in the HSC for a non-selective school, and which has such a great reputation on the sports field and at the same time produces such quality drama and musicals, you really have to stop and look around once in a while and just realise how lucky you are to be here.

Two days ago I started at Sydney Uni, doing a Bachelor of Pharmacy. As for the future I would like to get into the industry in drug research and development and see where that takes me, or I might go on to do a medical degree. Either way the future is wide open and holds a lot of possibilities, and I'm really enjoying the uni life at the moment.

I would like to wish the current Year 12's the best of luck for the HSC. Somehow this year will simultaneously be the worst and the best of your life. I'm sure you will hear it a million times between now and the HSC but try not to get distracted by the 18th birthdays, and try and keep a balance between school, sport and social life, because there's no law against having a big night on Friday or Saturday night, and then working hard throughout the week to achieve your goals. 1. THE POWER OF PRAISE

Imagine spending all Saturday afternoon weeding a garden only to have someone point to the few weeds you missed. Yet, sometimes, that's what we do when children ask us to read their story! We concentrate on the mistakes: *'That's nice dear, but you've spelt "elephant" wrong on the second page...'*

The next time you read their writing, try telling your children what they are doing right, (praise) instead of focusing on the mistakes that leap out at you. Praise should always be specific. Not vague generalizations like *'that's great'*, or *'lovely work'* or even *'well done'*. Genuine praise looks at real reasons.

How does praise alone (without pointing out the faults) help children? Well, now they know their strengths – this means they will keep on using those techniques you praise. Then, after the praise, you could add in ONE gentle suggestion for improvement.

Finally, always finish on a positive note. That's right more praise!

2. HEAD OF THE RIVER

(i) Transport:

- Six buses will leave from the Archway at 8am for boarders only. These buses will be supervised by boarding masters.
- Five buses will leave from the Gartlan crossing at 8am for day boys and their families. These buses will be supervised by staff.
- One bus will leave from Chatswood Station at 8.15am for day boys and their families. This bus will be supervised by staff, including Mr Clarebrough.

The buses will return to the school and to Chatswood Station after the 1st VIII race. They should leave Penrith by about 1 pm and arrive back before 2.30 pm.

(ii) Venue: Our viewing area is on the Southern Bank with Kings, Scots and Sydney High.

(iii) Uniform: Boys are to wear khakis with ties and long grey socks. There is to be no other 'decoration' i.e. no paint. If hats are worn, they are to be Riverview caps only.

(iv) Behaviour: We expect that all Riverview supporters will

positively support our crews and graciously acknowledge crews from other schools. Riverview is well known for this. All the focus on the day is to be on the crews on the river.

The police have informed schools that it is illegal to throw anything into the water or to enter the water. Should any spectators chose to disregard this, the matter may be out of our hands.

All our boys are asked to follow, without question, the directions of any teacher or responsible adult on the day. We are informed also that it is the venue policy, at the Sydney International Regatta Centre, that no glass is to be brought on the site and that this policy will be enforced by the police for the safety of all.

Tickets will be on sale at a cost of \$10.00 each.

3. OPEN DAY – SATURDAY 24 MARCH

Open Day takes place on the day of the Gold Cup Regatta, the last Saturday of the Summer Sports season when most senior teams will be playing at Riverview.

We're calling on the generosity of our Year 11's and Year 12's to act as tour guides. Each boy in Year 11 and 12 will receive a letter from me this week, asking them to volunteer in the morning for an hour. I know many have commitments on that day and that the Year 12's will have begun their exams on Friday, 23 March, but we need about 60 volunteers to take a group of about 10 or 12 and show them those areas of the school that are on the tour route.

4. THEFT

We have been back less than five weeks and, already, there are reports of alleged stealing of boys' belongings – school bags, money, wallets, ipods, clothing. This is a sad indictment of the morals and values of a small minority of our boys. But is a reality. And it erodes trust: How are boys to walk down the corridors without suspecting their colleagues of theft?

Some basic advice:

1. Label and mark all belongings.
2. Don't bring valuable items to school.
3. Leave all belongings in a secure area.
4. Report any loss and any genuine suspicions as soon as you can.

It is a disappointing fact that we may have to provide more security, more surveillance cameras, more secure places. I don't want to trivialise such a serious matter but I read *'The Strange Laws of Old England'* by Nigel Cawthorne, during the last year. He mentions the harsh penalties of the feudal times:

'Richard the Lionheart made a law against thieving sailors which said: "Whosoever is convicted of theft shall have his head shaved, melted pitch poured upon it, and the feathers from a pillow be shaken over it, that he may be known to all."'



5. UNIFORM

The Year Co ordinators have outlined their expectations very clearly throughout this year. I ask boys and parents to help: shirts that fit, ties that are done up, garters with socks, black belt with shorts, shoes that are cleaned regularly, hair that is neat, faces that are clean shaven, where appropriate.

It is frustrating to have to correct boys constantly and it is extremely disappointing to hear of or to witness boys in public with little regard for their uniform or respect for and pride in Riverview!

Let's make a concerted effort.

6. LATE ARRIVALS

Similarly, this is an unedifying part of Riverview. Those who are late for reasons little better than 'slept in' or 'missed bus' or 'late(!)' will be required to arrive at school by 8am and report to their Year Co ordinator for as long as it takes to correct this form of laziness and carelessness.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF SENIOR SCHOOLING

UAI SCALING AND SUBJECT CHOICES.

This article, written by Fr Robert Bruce SJ, contains excellent information about UAI scaling and subject choices:

The purpose of UAI scaling is to transform marks allotted in different subjects to a common scale i.e. to marks which have similar value no matter from what subject they are taken. So, by using such scaled marks authorities should be able to compare the performance of students studying different subjects. How would athletic authorities compare the quality of the performance of a high jumper with that of a 1500 metre runner? They might compare the performance of the two athletes with the best performances of athletes from around the world in each of the events. They might rank them as equal if they were both ranked 2nd in the world on performances. Although this does not have complete parity with the scaling process, it gives some idea of the aim of the authorities to compare performances in different fields.

Some students seem to believe that their HSC marks will be scaled up if they study a particular course. 4 Unit Maths is one of the few courses to be 'scaled up' by the universities. If a course appears to be hit hard by the scaling process, it usually means it is easier to gain higher marks in that course. So, in theory, a student in such a course should gain much the same scaled mark as he would in an academically more demanding course: gaining a high exam mark and being scaled down will be equivalent to gaining a lower mark and being scaled up.

Maths v General Maths and Advanced v Standard English are two common issues of uncertainty for parents and students when they make choices. Maths and Advanced English scale better than General Maths and Standard English [except for the higher HSC marks in Standard English], but they are more difficult and



more challenging courses and it is harder to score, for example, an HSC mark of 75 in the more challenging courses than the same mark in the less challenging ones.

So, based on what has been said above, should we say it does not matter: you will get much the same scaled mark whichever course you study? No. This is when the advice of experienced teachers is important. The probable or proven ability of a student in a particular subject needs to be matched with the degree of difficulty of the various courses in that subject. A student with low ability in Maths would be foolish to attempt 4 Unit Maths because it is scaled up: he or she would gain quite a low HSC mark and even if it were scaled up, it would be much lower than the scaled mark s/he would have gained from attempting an easier Maths course more in keeping with his or her ability. The same applies to English. And often the strain of attempting a course beyond one's capacity will lessen the effort and performance in other courses.

I suggest that it is normally a mistake to choose courses because they appear to scale better. The old advice is still the best:

1. choose courses which the student likes
2. which s/he seems to have ability at
3. at a level which suits the ability of the particular student.

With an eye to post-school demands, some balance in the pattern of choices to provide versatility, and suitability to probable career options may be relevant. In the end, if a final choice between options based on these criteria cannot be made, then perhaps relativities of scaling might be considered.

FROM THE CAREERS COUNSELLOR

Our Year 12's last year have been extremely successful in their university offers and scholarship applications. 268 offers of places (compared to 220 last year) were made across the preliminary, early, main and late rounds were sent to 204 of the 240 students. Courses offered were from all university faculties covering a vast area of study alternatives. One boy received 4 offers of courses, 5 boys were offered 3 places each while 52 (34 in the previous year) boys were offered 2 places. This is an outstanding result for the boys who all worked hard to research their options and the pathways available. It also illustrates the benefits to be gained by evaluating and changing course options after receiving the UAI then reassessing and changing options following the main round of offers. This can create the situation where the new preference can be considered by UAC and an offer made in another course. Knowing the intricacies of the application process is an essential aspect of the whole application procedure and I emphasise it with the boys. Covering all bases in an attempt to obtain an offer for the most preferred course is vital along with investigating what courses still have vacancies following the publication of each round of offers.

Sydney University was once again by far the most popular university for the boys with 83 places being offered, followed by University of Technology 49, UNSW with 46, Macquarie University with 29, University of Western Sydney 14, University of New England 12, Australian Catholic University 8, Newcastle University 6, Charles Sturt University 5, Bond University 3, Southern Cross University 3, Australian National University 2, and La Trobe University and Wollongong University with 1 each. Course offers covered everything from combined degrees with Law or International Studies to Medicine and Surgery,

Media and Communications, Pharmacy, Medical Radiation Science, Architecture, Design, Commerce and Economics and Chiropractic. Our boys certainly know about diversification when it comes to careers options.

A number of boys have received scholarships from universities. Owen Millar received the Peter Nichol Russell Scholarship for Mechatronic Engineering and Computer Science at Sydney University, David Conway received an Elite Athlete Sport Scholarship and Adam Campbell a sports scholarship also from Sydney University. Michael Williams won a Co-Op Accounting Scholarship with UTS, and 11 of our boys were offered places at the University of New England based on the Schools Recommendation Scheme. A few of our elite athletes were also given special consideration of up to 10 UAI ranks due to their sport commitments in playing at either state or national level. This recognises the dedication these boys have to their sport and how, at times, it can interfere with study and school obligations.

If the cake was cut into 64 cubes, there would be 8 with 0 sides iced, 24 with 1 side iced and 8 again with 3 sides iced. If it was cut into 125 cubes then there would be 27 with no sides iced, 54 with 1 side iced and 8 again with 3 sides iced.

The Smith Family's student2student programme is a unique and effective programme that has helped many students to significantly increase their reading skills.

Student2student works by matching students who need to improve their reading with older mentors, who are especially trained to help develop literacy skills in others.

The programme runs for 18 weeks a year usually between April and September. The mentor telephones the student two to three times a week for at least 20 minutes. The student reads to the mentor who uses the skills learnt in the training to assist the student with their reading.

The mentor keeps a simple record of each phone contact and reports progress to a supervisor fortnightly.

In previous years a number of students have volunteered to participate in this programme as mentors.
