# A significant day in the history of the College

## FROM THE HEADMASTER

Sunday's Mass of Thanksgiving for the renewal of the Dalton Memorial Chapel and the Official Opening of the Christopher Brennan Library and new English facilities were significant occasions in the history of the College.

More than 300 people attended the Mass which was concelebrated by the Rector, Fr Andrew Bullen SJ and Frs Gerry Healy SJ, David Strong SJ, Daven Day SJ, Christopher Willcock SJ, Fr Peter Beer SJ and Paddy Mullins SJ.

Among those present at the Mass were the artisans, crafts men and women and donors who made the renewal of the Chapel possible.

In his homily Fr Bullen, referring to various features within the Chapel such as the new stained glass windows, the stations of the cross and the Ascension window, spoke about Ignatius the Pilgrim following the way of Jesus towards God – a journey that never ends.

Following the Mass, the Governor, Her Excellency Professor Marie Bashir, officially opened the new Christopher Brennan Library. We were particularly delighted to have the Governor open the library as she has a great passion for Christopher Brennan and his writings. She also has many connections with the University of Sydney where Christopher Brennan was Associate Professor. Like Christopher Brennan, Professor Bashir was an undergraduate at Sydney University; she was Clinical Professor of Psychiatry there and, since 2007, she has been the seventeenth Chancellor of the University of Sydney.

It was also a great honour to welcome Professor Bashir to Riverview for as Mr James Rodgers, Director of Students, said in his welcome to the Governor: 'Your Excellency, you stand in a distinguished list of Governors of the State who have graced Riverview with their presence stretching back 120 years. When Lord Carrington, the Governor, was a special guest at the College's speech day in 1889, he was the first member of the vice regal office to attend any Catholic school function in Australia.'

(James also said in his welcome that when Lord Carrington came to Riverview he endeared himself to the students by asking the then Rector, Father Patrick Keating SJ, to grant the boys an extra week's holiday at the Christmas vacation. However, he added, Professor Bashir should not feel obliged to follow suit.)

In her official opening speech Professor Bashir said:

'There is no doubt that Saint Ignatius' College is one of the great educational institutions of this nation. Since its foundation, it has sought to provide its students with a sense of integrity, together with the wonder of the new, encouraging life-long pathways of learning and enlightenment, including the cultural riches of our

civilisation . . . Within this environment, the spirit and intellect of Christopher Brennan was nurtured...

It is therefore a most valuable extension of Saint Ignatius' ongoing commitment to the education of our young people, that this contemporary faculty of learning has been established.

Indeed, this magnificent Library and English Centre is an exemplary resource centre for the students . . . It will provide continuing inspiration and prepare our young people to negotiate the complex and challenging years ahead with equanimity and success.

It is therefore so appropriate that the new centre bears the name of Christopher John Brennan — poet, linguist and classics scholar — and one of our nation's finest intellectuals

I am touched and glad that the Council, the benefactors and the community of Saint Ignatius have seen fit to enshrine his name thus at the school who so positively influenced him.'

Speaking later the Governor noted that the naming of our library was an inspirational choice as Christopher Brennan is one of Australia's greatest poets and academics. The choice of his name for our library sits well alongside Sydney Grammar School's choice of Banjo Patterson for their school library, she said.

During the official opening, Old Boy Daniel Johnston, who was the winner of the Insignis Medal in 1994, read four verses from Christopher Brennan's epic poem 'The Wanderer'.

As Christopher Brennan did, Daniel lectures at the University of Sydney - in the Department of Performance Studies.

In my address at the opening I spoke about how wonderful it has been to work side by side with the Jesuits and College Council

on the building of this new library.

'Together we have delivered a building which not only promotes questioning, imagination and dreaming but also academic excellence. Inspired by our staff in Jean Agior-tis and June Wall with the architectural expertise and passion for excellence of Peter Mayoh and Charlotte Hunyor, we now have a library and English centre that stands geographically in the middle of our College grounds and facilities and philosophically at the heart of Jesuit education.

In his senior years at Riverview Christopher Brennan was trusted with the freedom of the then Jesuit Library where he acquired encyclopaedic knowledge with ease. I really do hope that occasionally our students will take a brief moment to think of what Brennan achieved in his life through the use of the knowledge he'd obtained from libraries - places that inspired him - and through his Jesuit education which encouraged him to question everything and to use his talents in the service of God.'

Next year, Fr Andrew Bullen SJ, our much loved Rector, will be going on sabbatical leave during Terms 1 and 2. At this stage Andy hopes to be spending some of time with his sister who lives outside of London.

Last week, the Provincial, Fr Steve Curtin SJ announced that Fr Gerry Healy SJ will be Acting Rector during Fr Bullen's absence. Fr Healy is the Provincial Delegate for Education, a Physics teacher at Xavier College, a lecturer at Melbourne University and a member of the Riverview College Council.

We are delighted that Gerry will be with us next year.

### STAFF FAREWELLS

At this time of the year I am visited by a number of staff members who come to tell me that next year they will be moving on to new challenges, to new promotional positions in other schools or to retirement.

In schools such as Riverview, there are long-serving staff who when they retire take with them many memories and in some cases wide ranging experiences and expertise, much wisdom and significant Ignatian insights.

Recently, Dr Gregory Haines announced his retirement after 31 years at the College.

Dr Haines is a noted educationalist having written numerous academic articles and a number of books. He was a member of the Board of Studies at a time of radical reform in education in NSW and the History Co-ordinator at Riverview for several years. In more recent times he was Head of the John Courtney Murray Centre at the College and the Editor of 'Spark'.

He is also probably best remembered as being the driving force behind the school's Hot Potato Shop which over the years has attracted quite a diverse range of speakers to the College to address our students at lunchtime.



In true Jesuit tradition, several of these speakers have been 'counter-cultural'. Their presence has always raised lots of questions and plenty of healthy debate.

We wish Greg well in his retirement and know that while he may no longer be here first thing in the morning to greet the early 'arrivers' he will continue to send us e-mails to inspire us in our educational reading.

We are also sorry to be saying goodbye to Mrs Anne-Marie Bennett the Head of our English Faculty. Anne-Marie has had a profound effect on the teaching of English at Riverview and in particular on our results in public examinations. Throughout her time here she instilled in our students an ongoing love of English. She is a dedicated and inspirational educator and we wish her well at Wenona next year.

### JESUS WALKS STATUES

Those of you who saw the decorated statues of the Sacred Heart on display throughout Sydney during World Youth Day earlier this year would acknowledge that these statues are very diverse in their appearance and in the messages they present.

The exhibition of the statues, known as the JesusWalks Exhibition was curated by Helena McCarthy who invited young artists from across Australia to each paint a statue of Jesus which explored ideas of faith in contemporary society.

A total of 33 statues were on display in the exhibition including statues which featured indigenous artwork, graffiti messages and mosaic reflections of faith.

At the Assembly this week three of the statues were presented to the College. Two of the statues were given by the young Old Boys who made them, while a third was a gift from the OIU. The statue entitled 'Messages of Faith' was designed by Jason Wing (OR95) who told the Assembly that his statue represents Jesus the Messenger. Jason's statue features Jesus holding an electronic message board where people can write their own message of faith. He said it was a way for busy people to communicate and discover what their faith is through modern technology.

Another statue, entitled 'Faith by Numbers' was made by John Sheehy and Sam Dunn (OR2002). At the Assembly Sam and John said they wanted to depict the way in which faith today is trivialised. For many people it becomes just another hobby – something they practise only when they have time to do so. The statue features numerous blank spaces with numbers in them – like children's colouring-in books. When you look at it from a distance the statue looks completed, but when you get close to it you realise there are lots of blank spaces to fill. John and Sam said their aim was to encourage people to 'complete' the artwork by active participation and reflection on their own faith.

The third statue presented to the College features silhouettes of little children. It takes its inspiration from Mathew 19:14 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.' This statue was made by two students involved in Mission Australia's Creative Youth Initiatives (CYI) program.

I asked three main questions in this letter:

**FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CO-CURRICULUM**

##### WASTE AUDIT PART 2

Last Wednesday Houses and classes joined in the second round of the College Waste audit – to see which house or class could significantly reduce their rubbish count. Boys were encouraged to bring a low waste lunch by using a re-usable lunch box, avoiding the use of foil and plastic wrap, bringing fruit instead of pre-packaged snacks. The boys entered into the spirit of the competition. Though some waste may have ended up in pockets and later in the washing machine, there is increasing awareness of the amount of waste being generated.

The overall results of the second audit are below. We reduced our overall waste by one third. Ricci House was the biggest House loser, and classes 8.7, 6. and 5. were the biggest reducers in Therry. While Year 7 were unable to participate in the first audit they joined in the second audit and produced the least waste.

This waste audit has certainly highlighted that we can significantly reduce the amount of waste that we send to landfill though we still need to think about how much food packaging we really need.



 Celebrating 10 years of 'Helping Families Survive 0-5'

**Helping families survive 0-5:** Parent Infant Family Australia (PIFA) is celebrating 10 years of successfully supporting families with young children across New South Wales, with its first ever Ball. PIFA is an independent not for profit organisation, working in association with Centacare.

As we have seen in the media recently, many Australian families experience difficulties in coping with the everyday challenges of parenting in the early years. Since it is now widely recognised that the early years of a child's life provide the foundation for resilience and healthy adjustment later on, PIFA aims to enhance outcomes for children by supporting vulnerable families from pregnancy to five years of age. This is accomplished by **direct work with families** and by **support and training of professionals** who work with families. PIFA is providing strategic assistance that is working – helping to create healthy, stable and happy family environments – and we think that's worth celebrating!

PIFA was founded in 1998 by Fr Peter Quin SJ and Psychoanalytic Psychotherapist Norma Tracey. Fr Quin's work with couples preparing for marriage evolved over time into working with these couples, as they faced the challenge of becoming new parents. PIFA's **direct work with families** includes: therapeutic groups for mothers and babies experiencing perinatal distress, the Isolated Country Mum's Project, a parents in prison program and support for urban Aboriginal families, via home visits, group work and childcare support. PIFA's **support and training for professionals** working with vulnerable families during pregnancy and early parenting takes the form of group and individual consultation and outreach training:

**'Early intervention promotes child protection, increases school achievement, reduces violence and crime, promotes workforce productivity, reduces teenage pregnancy and has a long-term cost benefit ratio of 8:1'** (Heckman, J. 1999)
